ACTIVITY REPORT 2018 - 2023 CENTER FOR EAST ASIAN STUDIES







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Created in 2016, EASt is the **only inter-departmental research unit in francophone Belgium wholly dedicated to the study of East Asia**. As an interdisciplinary center, it gathers scholars from a wide range of disciplines including anthropology, sociology, philosophy, literature, film, theater, political science, international relations and arts.

EASt activities and research are organized around different clusters:

- Public spaces in East Asia
- Iconic and discursive representations in East Asia
- Gender and migration to and from East Asia
- EU-Asia relations
- Remote ethnography in East Asian studies

Benefiting from the ULB's Maison des Sciences Humaines (MSH)'s tools, EASt now gathers 60 members. Besides its initial expertise on key areas such as China, Taiwan, Japan, Laos, Vietnam, and ASEAN, EASt has expanded its scope both regionally and thematically through the inclusion of research projects on Central Asia, Thailand, Koreas, Indonesia and the Philippines; and the creation of the CHina Academic Network on GEnder (CHANGE) and the Philippine Studies Network, both initiated by EASt members.

As an incubator, EASt successfully **developed and carried out several individual and collective funded project research** led by its members. While the 5-year ARC project GENEsYs dedicated to the study of East Asian Youth's Identities and Practices in Public Spaces thrived and resulted in several impactful outcomes, **three EU-funded projects are currently led by EASt members as Principal Investigators.** These projects draw new active members and open even more possibilities for international collaborations.

Since 2018, EASt also developed its own **Routledge book series on "Contemporary Asian Societies",** which now includes five books (three edited volumes and two monographs), while two other books are in preparation for 2024 and 2025.





Regarding its visibility, EASt has released a **growing number of videos of public conferences and project presentation** on the MSH/EASt YouTube Channel. Beside the official page of MSH updating its agenda and news, **EASt created Facebook and Twitter accounts to enhance its visibility, while sending monthly newsletter.**

Outside the ULB, EASt has been, since 2017, an active member of the **France-based GIS Asie-Pacific Network**. EASt members were involved in events organized by the GIS, as well as in the GIS Scientific and Director committees and the Young Scholars Representative Office. EASt also maintained **closed and concrete collaborations with Waseda University and the University of Amsterdam** through the organization of workshops and summer schools.

Meanwhile, **collaborations with non-academic institutions** such as the Royal museum of Mariemont and the Belgian Royal Museum of Art and History or associations like the Institut belge des Hautes études chinoises are on the rise.



1. An expanding membership






As of June 2023, EASt gathers 60 members including ULB academics, PhD and postdoctoral researchers as well as associate members from other institutions. This represents an increase in membership of more than 40% since its creation in 2016. PhD and postdoc researchers represent altogether 43%. Most of them have joined through funded research projects and effective international collaborations.

32% are associate members: the majority were ULB PhD and postdoc researchers between 2016 and 2023 and have since then graduated or found permanent positions outside the ULB. They remained affiliated to EASt as associate members.

Other members (MA students + others, 10%) are long-term visiting scholars in the framework of European projects, for instance; or MA graduated who are applying for PhD fellowships or collaborating in collective projects.

2. An interdisciplinary team



75% from the Faculty of Philosophy and Social Sciences

25% from the Faculty of Letters, Translation and Communication

EASt (and the ULB as a whole) **is lacking expertise on East Asia in history, economics and law,** among other fields.

This gap could be filled by inviting experts through the MSH Guest Professor scheme and other subsidies. EASt members are mostly spread over (PhiSoc: two faculties Faculty of Philosophy and Social Sciences; LTC: Faculty of Letters, Translation and Communication) and the interdepartmental Institute of European Studies (IEE).

As in previous years, the vast majority of **EASt members are affiliated to one of the PhiSoc research centers.**


LTC comes in the second position.

Members of the IEE are usually affiliated to both the IEE and one of the PhiSoc research centers.

In 2023, EASt welcomed two new academic members in <u>Political science</u> and <u>Theater and performance studies</u>, thus expanding their scope of expertise.



3. A widened geographical scope P8



China and Taiwan: 41%

Such widening in geographical and cultural scope allows for more collaborative, comparative and transareal research.

Experts on Cambodia, Myanmar and other blindspots in EASt research have been invited to give talks and to join publication projects. EASt expanded its geographical scope over the past few years, now encompassing research on North and South Korea, Indonesia, Thailand and Central Asia.

Research on Japan now represent 22% (against 13% in 2018), while research on China has decreased from 54 to 32% (41% if including Taiwan). As research opportunities in China's Xinjiang Uyghur region decreased, new fields opened up in Central Asia.

4. Empirically-based research



One specificity and strenght of EASt is its capacity to **combine rigorous theoretical approaches and long-term empirical research**.

EASt members' **research is indeed undergirded by deep linguistic and cultural knowledge.** EASt members maintain long term **commitment to different regions of East Asia and showcase meaningful engagement with local actors on the field.** They generally create close collaborations with local scholars and academic institutions.

As they usually travel extensively in different parts of East Asia, EASt members are also able to provide **cautious but useful comparisons between different areas**. Their field also include diasporic communities in Europe, Asia, Africa and North America

Finally, EASt members often navigate complex and politically sensitive fields, displaying flexibility and developing unique strategies to conduct their research, while being **highly reflexive on their practice and positionality.**

5. Internship



As an international research platform, EASt's reputation and location in Brussels attracted students for internship and jobs.

EASt was lucky to accommodate **two interns in 2022 and 2023**, one Vietnamese MA student in International relations at ULB (Anh Minh Pham) and one French BA student from SciencePo Toulouse (Maëlwenn Chaperon). Maëlwenn conducted her fulltime internship from September to December 2023 (4 months), while Anh extended her 6 months internship from September 2022 to February 2023 with a paid student job at EASt and the MSH until October 2023.

During their stay, Anh and Maëlwenn accomplished several tasks: EASt webpage updates, promotion of events and members research achievement on social network, report writing, events logistics etc. This report on EASt development from 2018 to 2023 largely benefited from their input, as they collected, gathered and analyzed many data.

Although unable to provide them with adequate financial compensation (not mandatory for interns in Belgium), EASt tried as much as possible to provide "jobiste" contracts and basic appointments.


1. Events



Since September 2018, EASt organized **272 events**, 25% of which were organized with other academic or nonacademic institutions.

These events include **conferences**, **workshops** or **lectures**, but also **film screenings, theater performances** and **book talks**.





This table highlights the **impact of the Covid19 pandemic** starting from 2020.

Many events were postponed, canceled or moved online from 2020 to 2021.

There was a **new peak in 2021-2022 during the last year of the GENEsYs project** (which also largely contributed to activities in 2018-19).

2022 and 2023 mark the beginning of new collective and individual projects that will lead to more targeted events in the coming years, and to more collaborations.

2. MSH guest professors



Every academic year, EASt benefits from MSH subsidies to invite guest professors at ULB. **23 colleagues from around the world** (from Japan, France, Spain, the UK, the US, Canada, Denmark, Thailand, etc.) have thus actively reinforced their connection with EASt. For instance, Jeffrey Hall, Thomas Boutonnet, Jean Michaud, Ma Ran or Gwenola Ricordeau all **joined collaborative publication projects** initiated by EASt members; Zhang Yide was a **member of a PhD jury** in 2020; etc.

Increasingly, guest professors also join general courses given by colleagues who are not EASt members, to **add an Asian perspective for non specialists** in literature, performance studies IR or political science.

The only pitfall of the MSH guest professor scheme is the **low amount allocated, that requires to be complemented by other subsidies,** especially for colleagues coming from Asia and North America.

3. EASt seminar series



It is unfortunate that the EASt seminar series, previously organized by PhD and postdoctoral fellows, was not extended after 2022.

Instead, cohesion in the team and the integration of new members were enhanced through **"mises au vert" (social gatherings) and start-of-the year events** that gathered a large number of scholars. From 2020 to 2022, EASt organized a **monthly seminar series**, inviting young and confirmed scholars of East Asia to present their research in progress. Due to the pandemic and its aftermarth, most of these seminars were either fully online or hybrid.

These seminars, gathering EASt members and colleagues from ULB or other institutions, proved efficient in strenghtening EASt members cooperation and transdisciplinarity.

These seminars, however, came to an end in 2022 due to a lack of available members to maintain their organisation.






EASt 2023 Start-of-the-academic-year event gathered more than 40 people



Since 2016, 18 EASt members defended their **PhD theses** (see annex).

This successful rate of defended PhD theses explains why EASt PhD students now represent 30% of EASt cohort instead of 59% in 2018.

Most of them have now **embarked on postdoctoral research** either at ULB or abroad, or have **received permanent position** in Irish, French or Chinese academic institutions. Others have taken **positions in international organizations or policy institutions**.



Theses related to China account for 44% of the total number of PhD theses defended by EASt members, which is coherent with the proportion of China-related research projects led by EASt members before 2023.

Laos and Vietnam rank second together (28%), while ASEAN countries make up 11% of PhD research.

In terms of disciplinary areas, 6 PhD theses were defended in **anthropology**, 4 in **International relations**, 3 in **literature**, 3 in **political science** and 2 in **philosophy**. Considering recent shifts in geographical scope, **more PhD theses including Central Asia or Japan are expected** to be defended in the near future.



5. Networks and partnerships

Since 2017, EASt is an **active and the only international member of the French Academic Network for Asian Studies (GIS Asie-Pacifique)** that aims at bringing together, coordinate and support the academic communities in the field of Asian studies in the Francophone world. It brings together approximately 1,500 researchers.

This membership allowed several EASt reseachers to receive funding for conference travels and organizations, and to reach to wider audiences.



GIS Membership fees (1000€ per year) are currently covered by the MSH EASt subsidy. This subsidy is likely to end in 2026. Although relatively high, this investment if worthwhile especially when our members benefit from GIS subsidies.

Negotiations could be led with the ULB International relations office to cover these fees in the coming years. EASt could consider joining the European Alliance for Asian Studies (in which Belgium is not represented yet).

This network offers more visibility for courses, calls, events and fellowships provided by its partners.

III- Research projects and outputs

1. GENEsYs (2016-2022)





The research project **GENEsYs on Youth and Public Spaces in East Asia,** funded by an ARC advanced grant of €680.000 from the Université libre de Bruxelles has been one of the main projects coordinated by EASt between 2016 and 2022. Initially scheduled to end in 2021, GENEsYs was interrupted for about one year during the global pandemic, and benefited from an extension until the end of 2022.

The main objective of this project was to examine **the relationship between the construction of youth identities and public spaces in East Asia**. Gathering several partners from Europe and Asia in different disciplines, this project sought to understand how public spaces shape East Asian youth identities, how youth use public spaces, what the practices and strategies of appropriation are, and how the active presence of youth in public spaces influences the negotiation of beliefs, values and memory in terms of continuity and change, and shapes collective identities.

The GENEsYs project focused on four main perspectives: youth cultural and gender identities, youth social and ethnic identities, youth religion identities and youth political identities.


GENEsYs members and subprojects


The GENEsYs project gathered **16 junior and senior researchers**, including 4 academic staffs, 2 associate researchers, 6 postdoctoral researchers and 4 PhD students. Besides the ARC funding, the project also benefited from **two FNRS PhD scholarships** (Van Minh Nguyen and Clémentine Léonard) and **one FNRS postdoctoral fellowship** (Gwennaël Gaffric, who declined the fellowhip to take a permanent position in France).

As an **interdisciplinary and transregional project**, GENEsYs members included political scientists, anthropologists, sociologists, as well as scholars in cultural studies, literature and philosophy. They mostly covered China, Japan, Thailand, Vietnam, Laos. Expertise on South Korea or Taiwan was also occasionally added through invited scholars.



From 2016 to 2021, **GENEsYs members organized or joined a total of 74 activities** (with a short break during the pandemic in 2020).

Among these, about **30% were organized by GENEsYs project members**, including kick-off (2016), mid-term (2019) and final (2022) events. 70% of these activities were organized by other institutions. GENEsYs members offered, for instance, thematic panels in large international conferences (in Leiden and Tokyo among other places)



GENEsYs deliverables



Within 6 years, GENEsYs members delivered several publications and contents, including:

- 2 special issues
- Several book chapters and articles in peer-reviewed journals
- A virtual and physical exhibition.

GENEsYs exhibition titled *Asian Youth in Public Spaces* and curated by Van Minh Nguyen and Lisa Richaud, examines the relationship between the construction of youth identity and public spaces in East Asia. It showed, through photographs taken by scholars on their fields, the similarities captured vividly sharing among youths in Vietnam, Laos and China, regardless of their differences.

The exibition, available in English and French, was **displayed in Brussels** (ULB) in May-June 2021; in **The Hague** at the International Institude of Social Studies (Erasmus University Rotterdam) from November 2021 to February 2022; and **in Lyon** Jean Moulin University of Lyon 3 from March to June 2022.



2. EU-funded projects



In 2021 and 2022, EASt members have been particularly successful in obtaining competitive EU research fundings. Three EU-funded projects are currently carried out with EASt members as Principal investigators and main researchers.





Although the Covid19 pandemic led to a pause in projects and financing, **2022 has seen a very good recovery.**






A key achievement of EASt's proliferation as a research entity was the **creation in 2018** of the book series "Routledge Contemporary Asian Societies" that aims at providing an original and distinctive contribution to current debates on evolutions shaping societies, cultures, politics and media across Northeast and Southeast Asia.

This series allows EASt to offer an **original take on inter-disciplinarity**; reach new audiences, both with regards to possible authors as well as readers; enjoy a uniquely supportive institutional environment; and profit from its timeliness. The series is managed and directed by two members of EASt: Vanessa Frangville and Frederik Ponjaert.

Currently, EASt's Routledge Collection consists of five books: three edited volumes and two monographs, including EASt members and external collaborators.

Two other edited volumes are in preparation for 2024 and 2025, including one submitted to the series by exclusively external contributors, showing that **EASt series has gained visibility and relevance in the field of Asian Studies.**





5. Audiovisual materials

IV- Contribution to the ULB's outreach

1. Exchange programs with Asia P27



EASt directly contributed to the establishement of several **international Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with partners in Asia,** promoting student, teaching staff and researchers exchange as well as joint research projects and publications. Recent MoUs include Thailand, Laos and South Korea.

Over the past few years, EASt members also actively joined ULB delegations' travels to China, Taiwan, South Korea or Japan, sharing in-depth perspectives with ULB authorities on potential partners and collaborations, and serving as **an important interface between the ULB and Asian universities and scholars.**

EASt could consider creating an Instagram account to enhance its visibility on social networks.

So far, EASt communication has been developed and fueled mostly by EASt funded PhD fellows who take turn every year; or by interns. The challenge is to maintain this share of responsibility within EASt. EASt is often contacted by colleagues and networks from all around the world to create new partnerships or collaborate on events and projects. It was recently contacted by colleagues from Flemish universities to establish a South East Asian Studies network.

As such, **EASt has become a recognized** research entity in Belgium but also internationally.

4. Beyond academia: public outreach P30



While EASt is not policy-oriented but research-oriented, its **members' expertise if often sought after by policymakers**. Members of EASt are regularly invited to share their expertise at the **EU Parliament**, **Belgian federal and regional Parliaments**, **Belgian and foreign Ministries of Foreign affairs**, and other institutions.

Sharing the most up to date information based on both theoretical and empirical knowledge, **they are regularly invited on various media broadcasts (radio, TV, press...)** as commentators and analysts.

In that sense, EASt largely contributes to the ULB's public outreach, drawing on a wide range expertise and incorporating multiple perspectives in public debates.

What's next?



- EASt will be entering a new phase starting from September 2024. Having accomplished 8 years as an active MSH team, EASt will enter a transition period and search for **new institutional opportunities to develop its activities**. One objective of EASt is to enhance Area Studies at ULB in collaboration with other Area Studies research centers at ULB, and **create a formal Area Studies platform.**
- EASt hopes to continue **extending its research scope in terms of disciplines and geographical areas**, encouraging young scholars in various disciplines to apply for Belgian and international funding to join the team.
- Another EASt ambition is to develop and submit a new ARC collective project, gathering new and founding members to open up and structure new research areas in East Asian Studies.
- EASt also seeks to strengthen collaborations with the civil society (NGO, associations) while consolidating its efforts in dissemination within and beyond the academic world.

Possible action points:

- **Communication**: Create an Instagram account.
- **Networks**: Join the European Alliance for Asian Studies; and look for new funding sources for the GIS Asie annual fees.
- **Team organization**: Actively look for interns by publishing internship offers.
- **Guest professors:** Apply for different fundings than the MSH scheme to invite international scholars (ULB Chaire IN, others)
